OBJECTIVE:

Students will recall their knowledge of 4-H, UT, and government they have learned this as fun way to review and reinforce what they have learned.

4-H JEOPARDY

How many of you have enjoyed having 4-H this year?

We hope you have learned a few things about 4-H over the past few months. Things like...

- Tennessee 4-H is part of a certain famous University
- 4-H teaches us a lot of different things
- 4-H has a lot of different contests
- 4-H has its own pledge
- 4-H has its own motto

And lots more!



Introduce the lesson.

Call on a few students to share their response about each Point they should have learned about.

Be Careful! The class will be very excited about this lesson. Make sure you pick only those students who raise their hands. Be prepared to stop the lesson and calm the class down.

4-H JEOPARDY

We hope you have all of the things you learned (plus a few more!) stored up inside your head today because we are going to play 4-H Jeopardy!

There are five different categories of questions in 4-H Jeopardy.

- **Government:** these are questions about our local, state and federal government
- **4-H:** these are questions about 4-H in general
- **4-H Club Program:** these are questions about 4-H here in Claiborne County and in your club
- **University of Tennessee:** these are questions about UT, which we are a part of

Explain the five categories of questions to the class. Remember, we are dealing with 4th graders so make sure they understand the categories.

You need to make sure that they know the difference between the '4H' and '4H Club Program' categories.

4-H JEOPARDY

We are now going to play a game to test your knowledge of 4-H. This is a "Jeopardy-type" game and we will divide into three teams. Each team will have a team captain and that captain will select the questions for the team and will also give the answer. The captain will ask the team for help in determining the correct answer for each question. If one team gives the wrong answer, the question goes on to the next team until someone gets the right answer or all three teams have had a chance. The team with the most points at the end of the game wins.
